Trail Closures

Trail closures remain dynamic on [federal, state](#), and county levels. Be sure to check your local park before heading out on a trip. Camp grounds are also being impacted with a reduction in visitor capacity in some locations. Almost statewide, public land managers are requesting that visitors keep to their local parks, wear a face mask when around others, and maintain a 6ft distance from those not from your household. Additional closures can be expected on holiday weekends to prevent over-crowding.

Wildlife Encounters

Changes in public land use and the drastic fluctuations in visitor numbers seem to have a correlation with an increased number of wildlife encounters. I for example, have noticed more bears and snakes present on my trail rides. Knowing how to prevent an unwanted interaction and how to be safe around wildlife is critical for a sport like ours where we ride through the territory of many critters. The CA Department of Fish and Wildlife has [resources](#) available to better understand and maintain positive interactions with wildlife.
